Subsequently, the committee will count the votes and announce the election result at the CHUS Business Meeting at the AHA Annual Conference to be held in San Francisco (January 4-7, 2024). Specific time/date of this Business Meeting will be announced by the CHUS Board in due course. Elected members of the new board will serve for a two-year term (2024-26).

IV. CALL FOR THE NOMINATION/SELF-NOMINATION FOR CHUS ANNUAL AWARDS (2023-2024)

Call for Nominations/Self-nominations of 2023 CHUS Academic Excellence Award

1. Criteria

There will be two sub-categories for the award, each carrying a \$200 award from the James Gao Memorial Fund administered by CHUS.

- --A well-researched and influential **MONOGRAPH** that was published in English between September 1, 2022, and September 30, 2023.
- --A well-researched **ARTICLE** published in a peer-reviewed journal in English between September 1, 2022, and September 30, 2023.

Starting this year, an **Honorable Mention** commendation will be added to one or two of the book/article subcategories not recommended for the award, pending the qualification of the nominated/self-nominated scholarship. There is, however, no cash award with this recognition.

3. Eligibility

--All CHUS members are eligible for consideration of the award with evidence of publications in English in the form of a monograph or peer-reviewed journal article.

4. Nomination Deadline: October 1, 2023

5. Nomination Process

It can be a nomination or self-nomination

- --A candidate can only be nominated/self-nominated for one of the two sub- categories of the award, not both.
- --To make a nomination/self-nomination for either sub-category, please provide: 1) a full citation and brief abstract of the book or article:
- 2) a statement of no more than 200 words on its scholarly contribution to the applicant's research field. and

3) Please kindly send an electronic copy of the article or book, if available. The committee cannot make selection just based on a "brief abstract."

Please email all the materials to the three members of the Committee for Academic Excellence Award.

6. Selection

- --The Committee for Academic Excellence Award will review the nominated/self- nominated scholarships, discuss, and evaluate their academic contributions. The committee will make its recommendation for each sub-category to the CHUS Board by November 15, 2023.
- --The CHUS Board will decide the finalist(s) for the Award by November 21, 2023. If none of the nominees or self-nominees is qualified, the Award will not be granted.
- -- The CHUS Board will announce the awardees around Thanksgiving time and present the awards at AHA Annual Meeting in San Francisco (Jan. 4-7, 2024).

The Call for Nominations for the 2023 CHUS Distinguished Service Award

(Deadline: November 1, 2023)

The CHUS bestows the Distinguished Service Award every year. According to the by-laws and the CHUS tradition, this call is now sent to all CHUS members to solicit nominations.

- (I). All CHUS members are eligible to nominate a colleague or himself/herself for consideration for the Distinguished Service Award;
- (II). A nominator should submit a letter to the selection committee before the stated deadline and provide a clearly articulated rationale for the nomination. In the case of self-nomination, the applicant should provide a statement to highlight her/his contributions to CHUS;
- (III). When nominated for the Distinguished Service Award, the candidates should confirm their acceptance of the nomination with the selection committee and assist the committee in the evaluation process.

The selection committee and timeline:

The selection committee for the 2023 Distinguished Service Award consists of Dr. Jingyi Song (SUNY Old Westbury) (jingyisong5@gmail.com), Dr. Shuhua Fan (University of Scranton) (shuhua.fan@scranton.edu) and Dr. Liyan Liu (Georgetown College) (liyan_liu@georgetowncollege.edu) (Chair).

Please send your nominations along with supporting materials to the three members via email before or by November 1, 2023. Then, the committee will collect more information about the nominees, deliberate over their candidacy, and then vote to decide who will be the winner(s).

The committee will make its recommendation(s) to the CHUS Board soon after the deadline. The award(s) will be formally bestowed to the recipient(s) at CHUS annual business meeting during the AHA conference in San Francisco (Jan. 4-7, 2024). This year, the CHUS Board has decided that the Service Award recipient will also receive a \$200 award.

The Chinese Historical Review (ISSN 1547-402X) is a fully refereed and vigorously edited transnational journal of history and social sciences that is published biannually. The journal publishes original research on the history of China in every period, China's historical relations with the world, the historical experiences of the overseas Chinese, as well as comparative studies of history and social sciences. Its Forum section features interviews with leading historians and discussion of issues concerning the profession of teaching and writing history. Its Book Reviews section introduces recent historical scholarship published in Chinese generally unavailable to the English-speaking world.

The journal is published by the Chinese Historians in the United States, INC. (CHUS), which was established in 1987 and is now an affiliated society of the American Historical Association (AHA) and the Association of Asian Studies (AAS). The journal began its publication in 1987 under the title *The Historians*. In 1989 it was registered with the Library of Congress and began its publication as a refereed journal of history under the title *The Chinese Historians* (ISSN 1043-643X) until 2000. It adopted the current title when it resumed regular publication in 2004.

The past and current sponsors of the publication of the journal include: The Henry Luce Foundation, CHUS Membership Fund, State University of New York-Geneseo, Indiana University of Pennsylvania, Lake Forest College, and various institutional and individual subscribers.

Dr. Dan Du, Assistant Professor at the University of North Carolina – Charlotte, received a Research Travel Grant from Willian & Mary Special Collections Research Center in July 2023, which will fund her archival research on her second book project, American tea culture.
